The AVC-TGC leadership and representatives from other committee organizations welcomed all the Vietnam War-era veterans and their families to a rousing tribute honoring their service, valor and sacrifice. The Fort Concho contingent of Buffalo Soldiers fired a cannon two-shot volley to begin the ceremony. The historic Officers Quarters were decorated with the U.S. and Texas flags, the AVC-TGC and the Commemoration banners, committee member organization posters and Commemoration fact sheets. In addition to AVC-TGC leadership, the Mayor of San Angelo, the Chairperson of the Military Affairs Committee of the San Angelo Chamber of Commerce, the Head of the Angelo State University Library Special Collections, and Chairman of the Heritage Chapter - FTVA, all attended and presented the commemorative lapel pins, Presidential Proclamation, Certificate of Honor, and assorted commemorative materials. Veterans were individually called forward for recognition by year groups, with each group receiving a special round of applause from the audience. This created a special moment for each veteran family. After all the veterans were recognized, family members were invited forward and thanked for their special support and were offered a selection of the commemoration support materials (tin pins, stickers, etc.). 
